Education: Experiences through Exploring Interests

The field of education is forever changing. With new technology, new standards and new needs for discipline, being a teacher is easily becoming a harder and harder job. As a future elementary school teacher, I see the elementary years as being a foundation for the future. Education, to me, can be compared to a tour through a museum. I plan on using technology (such as iPads, SmartBoards, etc.) with my students, because this generation has a huge interest in it. I also plan on incorporating a lot of classroom activities and group work to get the students up and moving instead of just sitting in their desks. This is key to learning because students at the elementary level quickly lose focus. I plan to have my classroom function as a team in terms of communicating. By getting up and interacting with peers, students are learning not only to communicate, but also to communicate their opinions,

which is important for their future. To share opinions with peers and teachers is a very important skill to acquire. Students today have a variety of opinions, which are a response to their home environment.

Students today are a lot different than previous generations. They come from extremely different home lives, including blended families, separated parents, and many more. It is very important that the teacher understands these situations and does their best to be nurturing to these students. When teaching, I plan on doing quite a bit of hands-on activity, in which I will then have time to get to know my students. By doing this, my students will automatically find me more approachable and understand that I truly care. Many students also struggle with understanding the material being taught because they easily become bored, unengaged, and frustrated with what they don't understand. As a teacher, it is important to understand these differences and attempt to correct them. Students also struggle with just sitting all day learning things that they believe they will never use. Due to this, I plan on not only basing my class upon student interest, but also showing the students how they can use all the subjects that we are learning. This is key to getting students involved in the classroom.

As a student at Alma College, a liberal arts education is a very important piece of my schooling. I feel the same can be applied to elementary school. A student should be able to explore all the different subjects. While the students are somewhat forced to learn all the subjects, they begin to figure out what their interests are. These interests can quickly begin to build throughout schooling, which will eventually lead them to a career field. Due to the fact that a lot of different subjects flow into others, all subjects should be treated as equal. One is not more important than the other. It is important that all children gain a balanced education because it is the foundation for the learning to come.

As I said previously, I feel that learning through experiences is the best way to learn. This way, students are constantly engaged, which creates a very active and upbeat classroom.

When someone walks into my classroom, I want him or her to feel invited and comfortable. I want the room to be organized and clean, so we can work productively individually and as a class. I also think promoting positivity is a huge part of success not only in learning, but also in communicating. If a student does not feel comfortable in the classroom, they quickly will fall behind, act out, or shut down entirely. Therefore, it is important to have open communication between the students and the teacher. They should feel comfortable with one another. As far as classroom setup, I plan on having several nooks for different subjects, all to promote exploration of interests. There will be the reading area, the science area, the math area, etc., all on the outskirts of the students' desks. This way, we are constantly promoting exploration of the subjects, which gets kids thinking of the future and where they can use these subjects.

Schools, in general, are preparing students for the future. In elementary school, it is important that students get a strong foundation of all the subject areas that will be built upon in higher learning. The interests that the students gained in elementary school may change during

higher learning. This makes the foundation of having all the subjects much more important.
